


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About the book


1. The Now-Next Continuum

Core Concept

A mental model that helps leaders visualize decisions as part of a continuum rather than binary choices between present and future

Discussion Points

- How past, present, and future are connected through our decisions and actions
- Why both shortsightedness and extreme longtermism are flawed approaches
- The art of taking meaningful steps toward the future without abandoning present responsibilities
- How the model applies to practical business decisions around AI implementation and digital transformation





2. Harms of Action vs. Harms of Inaction

Core Concept

A framework for weighing potential harms that might come from acting too quickly versus waiting too long

Discussion Points

- Examples of companies that moved too quickly with technology (causing harms of action)
- Examples of companies that moved too slowly (causing harms of inaction)
- How to find the balanced approach of "ethical acceleration"
- The institutional and psychological biases that lead to either extreme

3. The Insights-Foresights Model

Core Concept

A decision-making approach that transforms good questions into insights and foresights

Discussion Points

- Why asking better questions is more valuable than seeking quick answers
- How to derive timeless insights from partial answers
- Developing "bankable foresights" that guide future actions
- Using this model to build organizational knowledge that transcends individual decision points



4. Through-Line Thinking

Core Concept

Understanding how decisions connect across time and their ripple effects through complex systems

Discussion Points

- The ecosystem effects of tech decisions
- The ethical implications of AI and data systems
- Approaches to seeing beyond immediate applications to long-term impacts
- Case studies demonstrating both successful and failed examples of through-line thinking

5. Ethical Acceleration

Core Concept

Moving at the speed of technology without abandoning human values

Discussion Points

- The false dichotomy between innovation and ethics
- Creating technology that preserves meaning and human connection
- Designing experiences that scale across millions but preserve individual humanity
- How leaders can institutionalize ethical considerations without compromising agility



6. Tech Humanist Leadership

Core Concept

Leading at the intersection of business objectives, human outcomes, and technological capabilities

Discussion Points

- Finding the overlap between business goals and human needs, then using technology to amplify that intersection
- Creating purpose-driven strategies that align organizational values with meaningful human experiences
- Building trust in hybrid and remote work environments without resorting to surveillance
- Fostering the skills of curiosity, creativity, and collaboration that cannot be automated
- Balancing optimization and integration in creating future-ready organizations
